Iverson Stepping Down

I was disappointed, but not surprised, when I got the news that Chuck Iverson would be leaving the bench of the Mount Marty women's basketball team to become the institution's full-time athletic director.

As much as I would love to see Chuck spend another 17 years on the Lancer bench, it does make sense for him to take a step back at this point. The daughter that played for him, Cassie, has

completed her college career. The family's other two children, Kara and Colton, both play for NCAA Division I colleges, one six hours away. In order to see them play, he needed more flexibility than a coach's schedule provides.

In the last 10 years, he took a sub-.500 Lancer program to the top of the old South Dakota-Iowa Conference, then to the top of the super-conference known as the Great Plains Athletic Conference.

Iverson's players have done well for themselves as well, including All-Americans like Katie Heine, NaTasha Dawson and, most recently, Tevan Wenbourne; and countless All-America Scholar Athletes. His players have done well for themselves after graduation, including one — Stacy Schulz — who is head women's basketball coach at NCAA Division I Cal State Northridge.

With all the wins and all the banners Iverson's teams have collected, I am sure that he is proudest of the fact that each player that started and finished her playing career under Iverson finished her degree as well.

Iverson's influence as an athletic director has been easy to see, with Mount Marty taking both Christopherson Awards that have been presented to the athletic department with the highest grade-point average. I am sure he will continue to have that effect on the entire department.

I expect that MMC will have a coach in place shortly, as I don't believe Iverson would have made this move so close to the school year without a plan ready to go. Whoever takes Chuck's seat on the Lancer bench will have big shoes to fill, and not just because Iverson is 6-foot-8.

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
