## Valley State Alumni to Gather for Founders Day

Mark and Diana Salzmänn Cooley Among “Grateful” Alumni to Celebrate CSUN History

Mark Cooley '68, MA '71 and Diana Salzmänn Cooley '68 met, courted and married at Cal State Northridge. The former basketball star and head song-leader recall a campus where everything was new; the trees were tiny and few classes had more than 30 students.

“Mark was starting center and MVP of the Matador men’s basketball team during the 66–67 season. Song leading at the games, I kept noticing this good looking guy running up and down the court,” said Diana. Friends arranged for the pair to meet at a party and the rest was history. They started dating in February 1967 and got married in June 1968, a week after Mark’s graduation.

“The sixties were a great time to be on campus,” recalled Mark. “The school was young and our professors were excited to be teaching at a new university.”

“It was idyllic as well as tumultuous,” added Diana. “There were so many changes happening in the country. The Vietnam War had

## Civil Rights Leader Joins Cal State Northridge for Initiative

The Rev. James Lawson to Lecture on Civil Discourse and Social Change



The Rev. James Lawson Jr., a prominent leader of the civil rights movement and recognized by the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as the “greatest teacher of nonviolence in America,” will join Cal State Northridge as a visiting scholar for the 2010–11 academic year.

Lawson’s appointment is in conjunction with a year-long, campus-wide initiative on “Civil Discourse and Social Change,” organized by Northridge faculty and students. He will give eight public lectures and facilitate eight student workshops

over the course of the year.

Lawson’s first public lecture at CSUN, “Civil Discourse and Social Change: Where Are We Now?” will take place on Monday, Sept. 13, from 4–6:30 p.m. in the Armer Theater in Manzanita Hall 100. The general public is welcome and encouraged to attend. For more information, visit [www.csun.edu/cdsc](http://www.csun.edu/cdsc).

In light of national and state-wide debates on controversial topics such as the budget cuts to education and other public institutions, immigrant rights, U.S. involvement in two major wars and gay marriage, faculty and students at CSUN are taking a proactive stance to educate and equip the campus community with valuable skills for civil discourse and effective strategies for social change.

“The potential of the initiative is extraordinary,” said Kathryn Sorrells, professor of communications and co-organizer of the initiative. “We hope to create opportunities for our campus community to grapple with controversial social issues, develop productive communication skills and learn strategies for effective social change.

“The initiative is intentionally not tied to any specific classes,” Sorrells

said. “We set it up to vary from Monday to Tuesday to reach as many classes as possible. At least 20 classes across the university are using resource material connected with ‘Civil Discourse and Social Change’ that are listed on the website.”

There will be a variety of other guest speakers included under the initiative as the semester progresses—

faculty members and departments are identify and inviting guest speakers, she said.

Lawson was and still is an advocate for nonviolent social change. In 1951, Lawson declared himself a conscientious objector and refused to report for the draft. He served 14 months in prison after refusing to take either a *Lecture Series continued on page 3.*

# Cal State Northridge Ramps Up Services to Veterans

*With More Than 400 Student Vets on Campus, the University Offers A Range of Programs*

In Iraq, veteran Elmer Solis '10 (Kinesiology) learned to quickly assess situations and formulate a plan of action. Arriving at Cal State Northridge, the 26-year old former Marine observed that there was little coordination of programs and services for veterans within the university's administrative units.

"We once lived on expired chocolate granola bars for three months because the enemy kept blowing up our supply convoys," Solis said. "Several of us finally went to our senior officers and volunteered to provide extra security. The convoys got through and we got to eat real food again."

Solis decided to apply similar initiative at CSUN. In fall 2007, he became a work study assistant to the veterans' coordinator. Solis' first priority was to try and establish a student organization for veterans on campus.

"Research shows it can take at least three to five years before people who've served in the military want to re-associate themselves with their memories and experiences," said Solis. "I knew other veterans would show up because being comradely is such an integral part of our character and training."

After three years of persistence, Solis was finally able to charter the Veterans Student Organization at CSUN in 2009. The newly established

organization provides both a communications and social network for veterans, and strives to educate other students and faculty on the needs of student veterans.

There are 412 identified student veterans at Cal State Northridge, according to Eloisa Smith, veteran's coordinator for admissions and records. She said there may be more but the university can only count those veterans who have used the GI Bill to fund their education.

California leads the nation with 2.2 million veterans, 9.2 percent of the nation's total veteran population. On average, 27,000 veterans migrate to California annually. The Troops to College program was created in 2007 by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger to attract veterans to California's public universities and colleges by making campuses more veteran friendly.

CSUN provides a variety of services to veterans from free counseling for those veterans affected by post

traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and anxiety to financial aid and scholarships.

The College of Engineering and Computer Science has partnered with the State of California, Division of Apprenticeship Standards, local community college and private employers, to offer an apprenticeship program to selected veterans. Participants in this program pursue a degree or certificate program at CSUN, a local community college, or both, while working for the private employer.

"Veterans have given blood, sweat, and tears to help others," said Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Harry Hellenbrand, who during the 2009-10 academic year convened a special committee to review the needs of veterans at CSUN.

"It is only fitting therefore, that we help them help themselves, and as their records already show, the education that we provide them will be paid back to society at large through selfless service."

Next on Solis' agenda is to find funding for a center that would provide centralized information and job opportunities for veterans.

"Veterans bring a diversity of experience and opinion to CSUN," Solis said. "We owe it to them to help make their transition into the academic world both smooth and welcoming." ■

higher volumes of traffic along the main thoroughfares around Cal State Northridge.

While traffic is usually a sure sign that classes have begun—a final state budget is not. Once again, Cal State Northridge has begun its new academic year without a final budget from the governor and the Legislature. This delay has several negative impacts on students. Waiting for a state budget means students on the admissions wait list are prevented from enrolling for the fall semester,

the university cannot offer additional sections for the most sought after courses, and transfer students, including many community college transfers, do not know if they will be able to enroll for the spring semester.

While both the governor and legislative leaders have proposed budgets that provide the California State University system with \$365 million in additional support, without a final budget certain decisions cannot be made. A more timely enactment of a state budget would help Cal

State Northridge better serve students. In the meantime, university faculty and staff are working hard to serve new and current students who may be frustrated by smaller course offerings and waitlists.

Despite the traffic and a lack of a state budget, a walk around campus is particularly inspiring this time of year. The buzz of a new academic year reminds us of how important a college campus is to a region and the many communities it partners with. This column will feature some of those partnerships this academic

*The Phenomenal Woman Awards Raises Funds to Support the Gender and Women's Studies Department*

Cal State Northridge officials next month will celebrate the contributions of six "phenomenal" women whose efforts to make the world a better place have touched the lives of thousands.

The Ninth Biennial Phenomenal Woman Awards ceremony is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 23, in the Grand Salon of the University Student Union on the east side of the campus at 18111 Nordhoff St. in Northridge.

The honorees are: "SoCal Connected" anchor Val Zavala, vice president for news and public affairs for Los Angeles public television station KCET; Katherine Spillar, executive vice president of the Feminist Majority Foundation and the Feminist Majority; Andrea Smith, co-founder of Incite! Women of Color Against Violence and the Boarding

School Healing Project; acclaimed artist and writer Synthia Saint James; Lisa Powell, founder of the online organizing network Camp Courage and co-founder of Black Lesbians United; and Roberta Madison, professor emeritus of health sciences at Cal State Northridge and a noted epidemiologist.

## New Lighting Brings Nighttime Soccer Back to CSUN

*First Games Bring Out Record-Breaking Crowds*

The Cal State Northridge Athletics Department has installed new permanent lighting at the Matador Soccer Field, ushering in the return of nighttime soccer to the San Fernando Valley.

Construction of the lighting was completed earlier this spring, in anticipation of the fall 2010 Matador men's and women's soccer team home games.

The light poles are located on both ends of the soccer field and the adjoining field, paving the way for the first night soccer game at CSUN since 2001. The first game took place on Aug. 22, pitting the women's soccer team against the University of Portland.

"The installation of lights at Matador Field will allow our teams to compete with the nation's very best in collegiate soccer," said CSUN Athletics Director Rick Mazzuto. "It's

This year, a lively program has been planned. Festivities will include a close-up, visit of the Valley Performing Arts Center, which will officially open with a gala celebration on Jan. 29, 2011. University officials also will dedicate the Ralph Prator Fountain, named for the first president of the

university who served from 1958–1968. Alumni who earned their CSUN degrees between 1958 and 1960 and faculty and staff who have worked at the university during that time will be inducted into the 50-Year Club.

"Fifty years ago on Aug. 23, 1960, the Alumni Association of San Fernando Valley State College was established," said Gray Mounger, assistant vice president for alumni

affairs. "Founders Day brings together individuals who have a unique bond with each other and the university they helped create."

The day's keynote address will be given by acclaimed author and essayist Kevin Roderick '83 (Journalism). As an award-winning journalist, Roderick has reported extensively about the politics, culture and history of Los Angeles and California. His

first book, "The San Fernando Valley: America's Suburb," remains a leading work on the growth and history of the Valley.

"Founders Day is a time when we can go back to our roots," said Mark.

"We hope that by keeping history alive," said Diana, "there will be a richer relationship between Cal State Northridge and its alumni." ■

student or ministerial deferment. After his incarceration, he lived three years in India where he studied satyagraha, the principles of nonviolence resistance that Mohandas Gandhi and his followers had developed.

Upon his return to the U.S. in 1957, Lawson was recruited by

Martin Luther King Jr. to assist with the civil rights movement. He began holding seminars to train student volunteers in Gandhian tactics of nonviolent direct action in Nashville, Tenn., emerging as a central architect of the movement. On the eve of his assassination, King called Lawson "the leading theorist and strategist of

nonviolence in the world."

In 1974, Lawson moved to Los Angeles to be the pastor of Holman United Methodist Church. During the decades since, he has relentlessly spoken out against racism, unfair labor practices and U.S. military involvement throughout the world. In retirement, Lawson continues to speak out against

injustice protesting with the Janitors for Justice in Los Angeles, with gay and lesbian Methodists in Cleveland and with immigrant rights groups around the country. Lawson has taught at various universities and in the last three years was a member of the faculty at Vanderbilt University. ■
