Volunteers Honored at Annual CSUN Appreciation Event

Longtime Sports Enthusiasts Jim and Mary Gorman Among Those Honored

Cal State Northridge's top volunteer honors were awarded to longtime sports enthusiasts Jim and Mary Gorman and political science professor *emeritus* Warren Campbell at the annual Volunteer Service Awards ceremony on Nov. 6.

President Jolene Koester, Vice President for University Advancement Vance Peterson and Alumni Association President Larry Twersky, '85 saluted the Gormans and Campbell and 23 other dedicated volunteers.

"Today we celebrate not just all of your volunteer efforts on behalf of Cal State Northridge but we celebrate California State University, Northridge and 50 years of life-changing opportunities," said Koester about the annual event.

The Dorothea "Granny" Heitz Award for Outstanding Volunteer Leadership, honoring alumni or friends of the university who serve CSUN as outstanding volunteer role models, was presented to the Gormans, among the university's most loyal supporters.

For over a decade the Gormans have been proud season ticket holders for multiple men's and women's programs, demonstrating support for both high and lower visibility sports.

While Jim Gorman has held formal leadership positions such as president of the Matador Athletic Association and as a member of the President's Athletic Advisory and NCAA compliance committees, his wife Mary has been at his side each step of the way serving as a friend and loyal advisor to Alumni Relations and Athletics staff. Jim created the first Matador fan e-mail list-serve to promote attendance at games.

Mary has been instrumental in creating an informal recycling awareness effort at Matador athletic and CSUN Alumni Association events.

Gorman's loyalty and leadership caught the attention of the Alumni Association and in 2000 he accepted an appointment to the Association's Board of Directors to "represent the interests of Matador Athletics and non-alumni CSUN fans." Shortly after his appointment, Gorman made his

mark and Matador Athletics began co-sponsoring events such as "Sell Out Saturday," "Alumni Fan Night at the Matadome" and "Rowdy Rooter Bus Trips" to away basketball games.

The Gormans' philanthropic support of the university is notable and although neither of them are alumni, they have been proud members of the Alumni Association since the membership program's inception in 2001. Having already made significant gifts to CSUN since their affiliation, in 2006 and 2007 Jim and Mary generously donated a total of \$210,000 in cash and gift annuities to the university to create and support the Jim and Mary Gorman Athletic Scholarship Endowment.

Warren Campbell has been awarded the Dean Ed Peckham Award (formerly known as the Emeriti Merit Award). The award was renamed in honor of Peckham who retired in 1991 as vice president of student affairs after working at CSUN for 24 years. He was trusted, admired and loved by students during his years as dean of students. After he retired, Peckham and his wife Dory remained close to the university supporting intercollegiate athletics, the library, cultural and *2008 Volunteer Service Awards continued on page 2.*

University Launches Web Environment Improvement Project

New Graphic, Content, Layout Standards Expected to Improve Access

Broken links, orphan pages and unidentified Web sites may soon be a part of Cal State Northridge's Internet Web history. University Advancement plans to conquer the "Fifth Estate" in an effort to improve the university's Web environment.

"With the increasingly sophisticated expectations and needs of our many audiences and constituencies, the importance of maintaining a campus Web environment that is current, accurate, graphically appealing, easy to navigate and accessible to all users

is heightened," wrote Vance Peterson, vice president for University Advancement and president of the CSUN Foundation, in an Oct. 29 letter to university leadership. "CSUN's current site does not in all cases meet these expectations and high standards."

For this reason, Peterson said his office has launched the Web Environment Improvement Project. The project has two components: Web environment clean-up and Web 2.0 "user-centered" development.

The Web Communications Com-

mittee, with the oversight of the Executive Technology Steering Committee, which is comprised of the university vice presidents, has developed an approach to reforming and maintaining the CSUN Web environment in a manner that will ensure consistency, clarity, and a good user experience for all. In order to be successful, it is essential for all Web

site owners to follow a common set of standards for content and practice.

Kimon Rethis, senior web producer and the project manager, said by Nov. 30 the team hopes to have identified individuals at the various colleges, departments and programs to assist with this project. The team will encourage the use of university Web Environment *continued on page 2.*

Gender and Women's Studies Honors Phenomenal Women

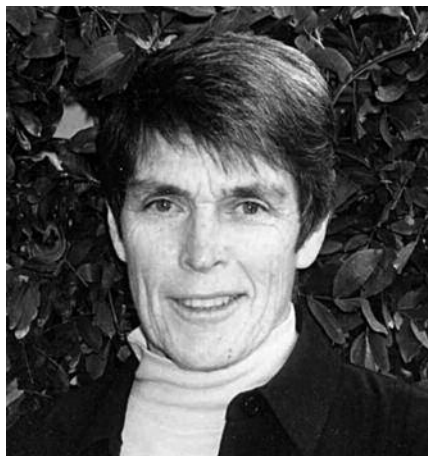
CSUN Political Science Professor Jane Bayes Among Those Honored

Cal State Northridge's Department of Gender and Women's Studies celebrated the contributions of five "phenomenal" women at its 8th Biennial Phenomenal Woman Reception and Awards Fundraiser on Nov. 8.

President Jolene Koester, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Harry Hellenbrand and Dean of the College of Humanities Elizabeth Say were among those in attendance to recognize the remarkable women.

"This event is truly a spectacular event...filled with the energy of people committed to justice, people committed to advancing the study and place of women in this world," said President Koester at the opening of the event.

The five honorees were: Jane Bayes, professor of political science and director of the Institute of Gender, Globalization and Democracy at CSUN; Susan Burton, founder of A New Way of Life Re-Entry Project; Graciela Limón, a Latina/Chicana writer, educator and activist; Nadera Shalhoub-Kevorkian, senior lecturer at the Faculty of Law-Institute of Criminology and School of Social Work and Public Welfare, Hebrew University-Israel; and Karen

Slade, vice president and general manager of KJLH, the only African-American-owned radio station in Los Angeles.

The award gets its name from Maya Angelou's poem, "Phenomenal Woman," which recognizes the strengths, abilities and integrity of women.

Nayereh Tohidi, chair of the Gender and Women's Studies Department, said this year's five recipients truly embody the spirit of the poem.

Since her arrival at CSUN in 1968, Bayes has been a trailblazer and mentor for many CSUN faculty and students. Co-author and co-editor of books relating to women's rights, globalization, democracy and religion, she has also been the recipient of the Distinguished Research Award for Research on Women.

Burton founded A New Way of Life Re-Entry Project in 1998 after battling her own addiction. The grassroots nonprofit organization is a sober living home for formerly incarcerated women in South Los Angeles who want to escape the cycle of incarceration, homelessness, addiction and despair. Since its inception, the organization has assisted over 250 women.

A native of Los Angeles and daughter of Mexican immigrants, Limón is a well-respected Latina/Chicana writer, educator and activist. She has "given a voice" to women immigrants through her books and other work. She devotes her time to writing reviews, critical works and creative fiction on topics of feminism, social justice and cultural identity.

Shalhoub-Kevorkian said her

goal is to "represent the voice of the Palestinian women." Her work has focused on the study of women in conflict zones. Her research on "honor crimes" has also led to the coining of the term "femicide."

As vice president and general manager of KJLH, Slade has remained true to her personal motto to "make a difference in the community in which you live." Slade has ensured the station's commitment to addressing local and national issues, from the 1992 L.A. riots to collecting and delivering clothing and toiletries to victims of Hurricane Katrina.

In addition to recognizing the five "phenomenal women," the event organizers hosted a silent action to help raise funds for special programming, student and faculty research, and to finance scholarships for Gender and Women's Studies majors.

The Department of Gender and Women's Studies emphasizes interdisciplinary, cross-cultural and transnational studies focusing on gender. For more information, visit <http://www.csun.edu/us/>.

performance arts. He was named "Honorary Lifetime Director" of the Alumni Association Board of Directors.

Campbell has demonstrated the same dedication as Peckham. He has taught in the MPA program since 1976 and had served as program co-director from 1985 to 2005. As a professor of political science from 1961 to 2001, Campbell's writing and teaching ranged from state and local government, public policy, urban administration, political and governmental ethics, to city planning. In the 1970s, he helped establish CSUN's Urban Studies and Planning Program and the Master of Public Administration program. He formally became the latter program's first co-director in 1985 and continues to teach MPA classes in the Tseng College. He is affectionately known and respected by many as "the father

of the MPA program."

Outside of the classroom, he has served on the Campus Planning Board, the Personnel Planning and Review Committee and the Faculty Senate and was a member of the Senate's executive committee. In the community he has served as the executive director for the Destination Ninety Forum Citizens' Planning Program, as a member of the California State Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, a member of the Valley Interfaith Council's Preventing Hunger Coalition and as a long time member and chairman of the City of Los Angeles Board of Zoning Appeals.

Campbell continues to mentor, teach and inspire. He has connected MPA and political science alumni to his adopted university by helping to establish alumni association chapters for those programs. ■

supplied templates that meet graphic standards and structuring documents "semantically" to make Web site content more accessible. They will also continue the university's efforts to make sure all Web sites are in compliance with state and federal laws requiring access by people with disabilities.

"It's about modernizing our Web environment," Rethis said. He said many Web sites developed "organically" without any controls or adherence to modern Web standards, so the lack of structure makes access more difficult.

"This will make it so people who search don't get a lot of erroneous results," said Rethis, who explained that by using the new techniques, it

will reduce the number of search results not related to a Web site user's topic as well as ensure page currency.

He said the team will assist Web developers across campus in upgrading their sites, including achieving accessibility standards and moving them into the Web 2.0 environment.

By Jan. 31, 2009, the team's goal is to have eliminated broken links, outdated content and orphaned pages. The team plans to implement the new Web site architecture (taxonomy) and graphic standards, assign ownership for each page and visibly show a link to that owner in the footer of each page by April 30, 2009.

Applications from transfer and graduate students, including those interested in earning teaching credentials, will still be accepted until the university's enrollment capacity is reached.

"It is extremely important that students start working on their applications now to assure that they are completed properly and submitted on time," said Javier Hernandez, director of CSUN's Student Outreach and Recruitment Services.

High school students interested in attending Northridge as freshmen
