HR Launches Workshop Series on Personal Finance

V.P. Tom McCarron and Dean William Jennings Offer Advice on Managing Debt and Improving Credit

Encouraging participants to take what he called a “commonsensical” approach to finances, Tom McCarron, vice president for administration and finance, said tightening your purse strings can actually lead to fewer sleepless nights.

McCarron and William Jennings, dean of the College of Business and Economics led a well-attended presentation on Personal Finance, Wednesday, Sept. 16 in the Oviatt Library’s Presentation Room.

“This is meant to be an enjoyable session from which you’ll take away tools that will help you sleep better at night,” McCarron said.

This was the first in a series of eight workshops titled “Building A Game Plan for Today’s Economy,” sponsored by the Office of Human Resources. The workshops will address the financial and emotional concerns of faculty and staff who fear they will be impacted by the current economy. McCarron and Jennings seamlessly shared the lecture podium while imparting valuable information on: good debt vs. bad debt, investments, credit scores, savings, investments, planning for retirement and other topics of concern to CSUN employees who have recently endured pay cuts due to the state’s budget crisis.

The next talk in the series, “Paying for College when Money is Tight,” is scheduled for Oct. 7.

Debra Rozanski, coordinator of the Employee Assistance Program, said the series is part of CSUN’s “commitment to employee well-being and to the

campus community during this difficult year of furloughs.”

McCarron said consumers need to be aware of several key factors:

- Paying credit cards late impacts FICO scores and the ability to secure good interest rates. Created by the Fair Isaac Corp., FICO is the most well-known credit scoring system in the United States.
- Consumers should pay off credit cards every month and never have debt that exceeds more than 30 percent of their income.
- Houses and education are generally thought of as good debt. Meals, vacations and the latest technical gadgets which can quickly run up credit cards are in the bad debt category.

“Your FICO score impacts everything in your life,” he said “from your credit card interest rate to your ability to get a mortgage. Protect it at all costs by making your monthly payments on time.”

Jennings told the audience that “saving money gives you more control over your life.”

“Many wonder how much they should be putting away for retirement,” Jennings said. He recommended putting away 15 percent per month of pre-tax pay towards retirement.

Cal State Northridge Enrollment Growth Halted

State Budget Crisis Forces Limits on Applications from Freshmen, Transfer Students and Others

Cal State Northridge experienced a drop in the number of students enrolled for fall 2009. This marks the first decline in enrollment in five years.

The Office of Institutional Research reported recently that the university welcomed 35,198 students for fall 2009, 1,010 less than last year.

The fall 2009 reduction is the first step in a series of enrollment cuts dictated by the state’s budget crisis. The campus’ operating budget for 2009–10 was cut \$41 million as part of a \$584 million reduction to the CSU system in the state budget. The cuts have impacted the entire campus community, resulting in employee furloughs, student fee increases and student enrollment reductions.

President Jolene Koester has said CSUN will have to reduce campus enrollment by 6,000 students by the

end of the 2010–11 academic year.

“We are no longer going to be advancing aid and earlier admission dates,” said Harry Hellenbrand, provost and vice president for academic affairs. “It’s been a terribly difficult thing to do because the university’s always been about accessibility.”

The largest decline is in first-time freshmen students. Last year, the campus closed the application period early for fall 2009 freshmen. This summer, the Chancellor’s Office instructed all CSU campuses to accept no admission applications for the 2010 spring semester from freshmen or transfer students.

Despite the overall decline in enrollment from last year, there were slight increases in the number of continuing, new post-baccalaureate and new transfer students.

“We’re trying to focus as much as possible on students making good

progress toward a degree and limiting the number of new students coming to the university,” said Cynthia Rawitch, associate vice president for undergraduate studies.

As for the increase in new post-

baccalaureate students, Rawitch noted that during times of economic hardship, it’s not uncommon to find an increase in students returning to school for more education. ■

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Founders Day 2009 Marked by Look Back at Valley History

President Koester Announces Plans to Rename Fountain in Honor of President Ralph Prator

From reminiscing about what's not here anymore to celebrating what remains the same, the second annual Cal State Northridge Founders Day celebration was enjoyed by all who attended.

President Jolene Koester also announced that the fountain in front of Bayramian Hall will be renamed in honor of the late President Ralph Prator, the first president of what was then known as San Fernando Valley State College. She said Prator, who served as president from 1958 to 1968, helped lay the foundation for the campus' remarkable academic and physical stature.

More than 100 former students and faculty attended the celebration on Friday, Sept. 25 at the University Club. Martin "Marty" Cooper, a name synonymous with the San Fernando Valley, delivered the keynote address, entitled "The San Fernando Valley... What's Not Here Anymore."

He provided a verbal tour of the Valley from its early years when Reseda was known as Marian, Canoga

Park was Owensmouth and Northridge was called Zelzah. Several popular eateries, he noted, have been shuttered: Dupars in Encino, Ott's Pink Pig in Van Nuys and Panorama City's Moongate.

"Communities, like people, tend to change," said Cooper, a 40-year Valley

resident who serves on the College of Business and Economics' San Fernando Valley Economic Research Center Advisory Council. "The more things change, the more they are the same."

Guests were treated to the sounds of CSUN's Jazz "A" Band and lunch.

The highlight of the event was the induction of 18 alumni and former faculty and staff, who graduated or began their careers at San Fernando Valley State College in the 1959-60 academic year, into the 50 Year Club.

"We appreciate this recognition," said Don Cameron, emeritus professor in the Department of Speech, who was invited to speak during the event on behalf of the inductees. Cameron, taught at CSUN from 1960 to his retirement in 1998. He said there are 16 of the 98 faculty who worked at the university still living.

"Most of us look back on that time as a time of unlimited opportunities," said Cameron who was among nine retired faculty honored at the event.

Koester said Founders Day is a "wonderful tradition."

Founders Day was first held last year, as part of CSUN's yearlong celebration of its 50th anniversary. Next year's event will honor the class of 1960-61 and will be held on Friday, Sept. 24, 2010. For more information, visit www.csunalumni.com. ■

Two CSUN Theatre Faculty Awarded Fulbright Grants

Cleveland and Morrison: Taking Their Theatrical Expertise Around the World

The grease paint! The costumes! The characters and their stories! Cal State Northridge theatre professor J'aime Morrison and lecturer Annie Cleveland are taking the magic of live theater around the world as the university's two latest recipients of Fulbright awards.

Morrison will be traveling to Portugal next spring to develop and create a dance theatre piece based on work by Portuguese poet Fernando Pessoa. Cleveland left last month for Taiwan for a nine-month teaching appointment in the Department of Theatre at National Taiwan University in Taipei.

Both women said they were honored to receive Fulbrights. Morrison, who was a runner-up twice for a Fulbright while a graduate student, said she was particularly "happy to

have finally become a recipient."

Cleveland, 59, of Northridge, is teaching graduate and undergraduate classes in costume and make-up design with an emphasis on computer-aided design at National Taiwan University.

"Computer-aided costume design is a relatively new field and I was very gratified to see the faculty at NTU encouraging exploration in computer technology as it specifically relates to costume design," she said before she left.

In addition to her teaching duties, Cleveland intends to collaborate with designers and professors from Taiwan and neighboring countries to evaluate the impact of computer-aided design on traditional pedagogy.

Morrison, 40, of Santa Monica, will be leaving in March for the Instituto

Politécnico de Laeiria, where she will teach a course entitled "Performance and the Body." While in Portugal, Morrison will do research and develop a new dance theatre piece based on the heteronyms- one or more imaginary characters created by a writer to write in different styles -of Portuguese poet Pessoa. Pessoa, who created at least 70 heteronyms.

Morrison said she hopes to bring the movement piece she creates on Pessoa's work back to CSUN. "I would love to see what our students here at CSUN would do with it," she said.

Cleveland's and Morrison's honors bring to 49 the total of CSUN faculty members who have received the prestigious Fulbright award since 1980. The Fulbright Program, the U.S. government's flagship program in international educational exchange,

was approved by Congress and signed into law in 1946. The goal of the program, which is sponsored by the U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, is to promote "mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries of the world."

Fulbright grants are made to U.S. citizens and nationals of other countries for a variety of educational activities, primarily university lecturing, advanced research, graduate study and teaching in elementary and secondary schools. Since the program's inception, approximately 279,500 participants-chosen for their academic merit and leadership potential-have had the opportunity to exchange ideas and to contribute to finding solutions to shared issues. ■

Federal Grant Helps CSUN Prepare Students for Ph. D

Grant Program Targets Students from Disadvantaged Backgrounds with Strong Academic Potential

Cal State Northridge has been awarded \$879,992 by the U.S. Department of Education for a program designed to give CSUN students the tools they need to succeed in graduate school.

The Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program will prepare students for doctoral studies through involvement in research and other scholarly activities. Northridge received a four-year grant that will fund support for 25 students each year of the award.

"This is a wonderful opportunity that we are happy to share with our students," said Mack Johnson, CSUN's associate vice president of graduate

studies, research and international programs. "The doors this grant will open for students who might not have otherwise had the means to, or even thought of, attending graduate school is fantastic."

The program, which began Oct. 1, targets students from disadvantaged backgrounds who have demonstrated strong academic potential. University personnel will work closely with the program's participants as they complete their undergraduate requirements. Once they've received their bachelor's degrees, the students will be encouraged to enroll in graduate school. Their progress will be tracked through their successful completion of

advanced degrees.

"The goal is to increase the attainment of Ph.D. degrees by students from underrepresented segments of society," Johnson said. The grant will be used to award students financial aid in the form of stipends, academic counseling, mentoring, research opportunities, seminars, internships and tutoring.

"We are going to do everything we can to make sure that they graduate from CSUN with the academic credentials to take them into some of the top graduate programs in the country," Johnson said. "But we aren't going to abandon them once they leave our campus. The grant gives us the

means to keep tabs on these students so we can make sure they have the tools to complete their various graduate degrees."

The Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program, also referred to as the McNair Scholars Program, is a Department of Education initiative with the goal of increasing the number of Ph.D. degrees attained by students from underrepresented segments of society, including first-generation, low-income college students. The program is named after scientist Ronald McNair, who died in the space shuttle Challenger explosion in 1986. ■

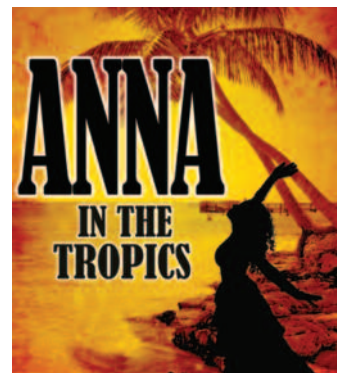
