Cal State Northridge has received \$500,000 from the W.M. Keck Foundation for a two-year project that exposes undergraduate engineering and science students to the study and development of nanotechnology. The project is designed to immerse students in nanotechnology through participation in research, interdisciplinary courses, pre-college activities and interaction with professionals in industry who work in nanotechnology.

Cal State Northridge's acclaimed public radio station, KCSN-FM 88.5, has won its 56th "Golden Mike" award from the Radio and Television News Association of Southern California. The award, for "Best Newscast—More Than 15 Minutes," was in Division B, for its Sept. 17, 2008, broadcast of the "Evening Update."

For most college students, merely graduating is the ultimate goal, but for CSUN senior Saharra White, that was just one of many ambitions. First, White wanted to start a black newspaper in the San Fernando Valley. Then, she wanted to go to Africa and teach. The 24-year-old journalism major and Pan African studies minor is spending five months in Uganda teaching children dance and journalism. Last year, she launched *Say It Loud!*, the only black newspaper in the Valley.

The spring 1994 semester began on Feb. 14, only two weeks late, after Cal State Northridge faculty and staff scrambled to erect more than 350 temporary classrooms, domes and portables. The structures stood in for buildings that were damaged or destroyed in a 6.7-magnitude earthquake that hit the San Fernando Valley a month earlier.
