[The Proposed Program Modification of the General Minor in Spanish consists of a reduction of the number and a new redistribution of its courses. It reduces the number of courses to be taken from 8 to 6 and divides them into two categories, namely, (1) Language and Linguistics and (2) Culture and Civilization. SPAN 210 disappears as one of the lower division requisites, SPAN 395 (Spanish Phonetics) changes its number to SPAN 425, and five already existing courses in FLIT are incorporated to the Culture and Civilization category. Because of these changes, the new minor strikes a pedagogical balance between language and culture and enable students to complete it in three years.]

This program modification has been necessitated by two factors. First, the MCLL Dept. has decided to streamline its existing minor programs by reducing the number of courses required for all of our minor programs from 8 to 6. Second, by doing so, we will take an

important step in enabling students to minor in a second language, attain some linguistic and cultural proficiency, and graduate in a timely fashion.

7. Estimate of Impact of Resources within Department, for other Departments and the University:

There will be no impact of resources since this program modification only involves a decrease in the number of units of an already existent program. The current faculty in the MCLL Dept. will continue to teach the existing courses—including the added FLIT ones in the Culture and Civilization section—that will be offered according to the normal rotation or sequence.

- 1. Prepare students for careers in teaching (secondary, community college, university), among others in legal, medical, administrative, and journalistic fields, translation and interpretation, etc. that require advanced level (ACTFL Guidelines) abilities in both oral and written skills.
