You are expected to meet with your other team members to decide how to organize your side of the argument. You may use notes but there will be no visual aids. This will then be followed by questions and comments from the audience. The debate will conclude with a 2 minute closing statement by each panelist. An anonymous poll of the audience will be taken before the debate and another one after. The debate "winner" will be the team who gains the most support from the audience.

Debaters will be scored on their delivery, organization and presentation of the argument, the strength of their argument, their knowledge of the subject and their persuasive ability.

Debaters are required to turn in papers (essentially a transcript, but including references) of their argument which will be graded on subject matter comprehension and knowledge, organization, and grammar and readability.

Written papers are due May 4.
