ACT-R is a combined 2-year Credential/Master's Degree Program offered collaboratively by CSUN and LAUSD. The program prepares teachers to serve students with disabilities in high need schools. Candidates obtain a credential in one year through full-time study as a teacher in residence. In the second year of the program, graduates are employed in LAUSD and obtain a Master's Degree while on-the-job. With an additional semester, candidates may obtain an Education Specialist Clear Credential. Candidates in ACT-R are eligible for a stipend of up to \$35,000 through a Teacher Quality Partnership Grant, funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

**ACT-R Program Components**

- **Core Courses:** Two courses completed by general and special education candidates that focus on foundational knowledge and skills for teachers serving diverse urban learners
- **Specialization Courses:** Classes each semester that target appropriate specialization areas
- **Clinical Experience:** One year apprenticeship completed in high need LAUSD schools with a trained and experienced special education mentor
- **MA:** Advanced coursework culminating in a Graduate Project that focuses on language and literacy

ACT-R is committed to preparing the highest quality special educators, teachers who are able to assume leadership roles and serve as change agents in high need schools. With a focused purpose to improve student outcomes, ACT-R graduates will promote educational equity for English learners and children, adolescents, and young adults with special needs.
