The Losers

- Students. The 23 campus CSU system lost \$585 million in state funding this year. Student tuition has increased by 32%. Faculty and Staff salaries have been cut by $\sim 10\%$.
- **Children.** California's Healthy Families Program dropped healthcare coverage for 60,000 children and 670,000 could be dropped by next summer. (L.A. Times, August 14, 2009)
- **The Sick.** Nearly 50 million Americans have no health insurance. CEOs of the largest health insurers testified before congress that they would continue canceling medical coverage for policyholders in need of care. (L.A. Times, June 17, 2009)
- All of us. The US spends an estimated \$100 million per day for the war in Afghanistan. The mass deaths and torture from the Iraq war will cost \$3 trillion according to Nobel Prize winning economist Joseph Stiglitz.

The Winners

- Oil Companies. There are 22 major petroleum producing states in the United States. Only one of them, California, does not tax oil as it is pumped out of the ground. California loses \$1.2 billion per year by not taxing giant oil companies like other states.
- **Corporations.** If California corporations had paid the same share of taxes on profits in 2006 as in 1981, corporate taxes would have been \$8.4 billion more. Loopholes in Proposition 13 allow corporations to pay lower taxes than homeowners.
- **The Wealthy.** Banking executives were paid \$billions in taxpayer bonuses after helping to ruin the economy. Congress gave Wall Street \$770 billion in taxpayer bailout money, and the total giveaway will be in the trillions of dollars. (L.A. Times, July 31, 2009)
