Official Catalogue Description:

A survey of major movements in 19th- and 20th-century art and art theory with reference to social, political, economic and ideological contexts. This course may include visits to museums and other performance/exhibitions spaces in the Los Angeles area.

Student Learning Outcomes addressed in this course are: Students will acquire competent knowledge and skills in various art media, concepts and methodologies; Students will solve/analyze visual problems at a competent level, including understanding/application of the elements of art and principles of design; Students will utilize and apply critical thinking skills to communicate ideas for their intended audience at a competent level in visual, oral, and written formats; Students will acquire historical and contemporary knowledge of diverse cultural and aesthetic contexts, including political, visual and material culture.
