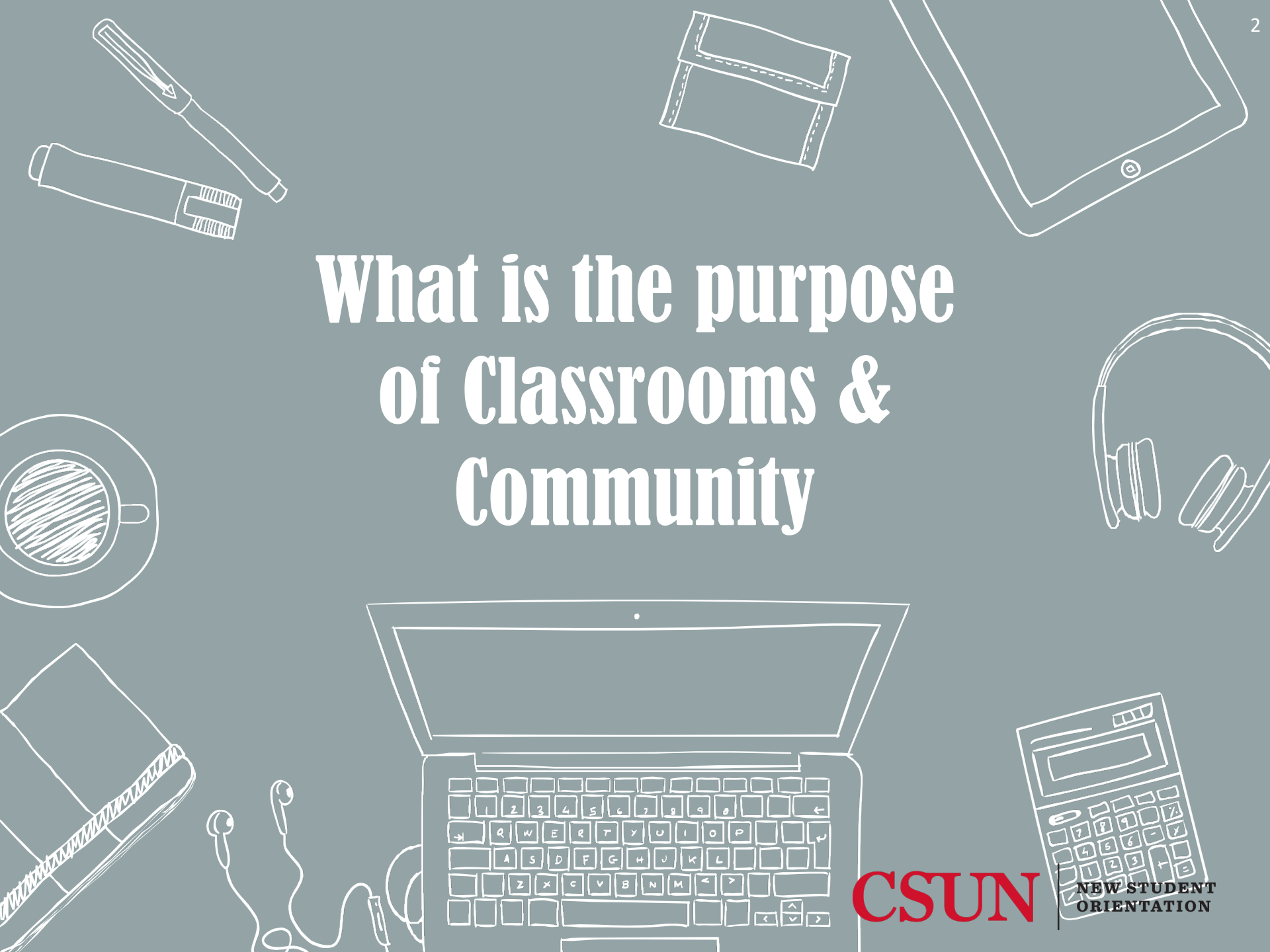

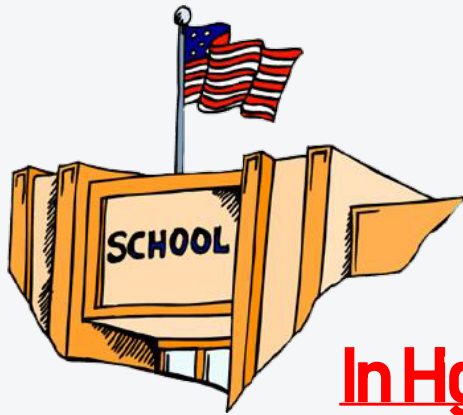

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Professor Expectations



- **SYLLABUS** - an outline and summary of topics to be covered in a course
- **ASSIGNMENTS** - are responsible for all assignments - whether given in class or outside of class
- **ONLINE INTERFACE: CANVAS, ZOOM**

Professors :

- Are responsible for setting both the academic and behavioral standards for their course
- May eject that students from class for disruptive behavior

Cheating

▪**Definition:** Intentional using or attempting to use unauthorized materials, information, or study aids in any academic exercise.

•Students taking an exam should assume that the **external use of any materials** such as books, or notes is prohibited unless approved by the instructor.

•Students must not **allow others to conduct research or prepare any work for them without approval of the instructor.** This includes commercial term paper companies.

•Substantial portions of the same academic work may not be **submitted for credit in more than one course** without approval.

Plagiarism

▪**Definition:** Intentional or knowingly representing words, research, ideas, or work of another as one's own in any academic exercise.

•**Direct Quotations** - Every direct quotation must be identified by quotation marks, or by other means of identification, and must be properly cited within the text or footnote.

•**Paraphrase-** Acknowledgement is required when material from another source is paraphrased or summarized in whole or in part in your own words.

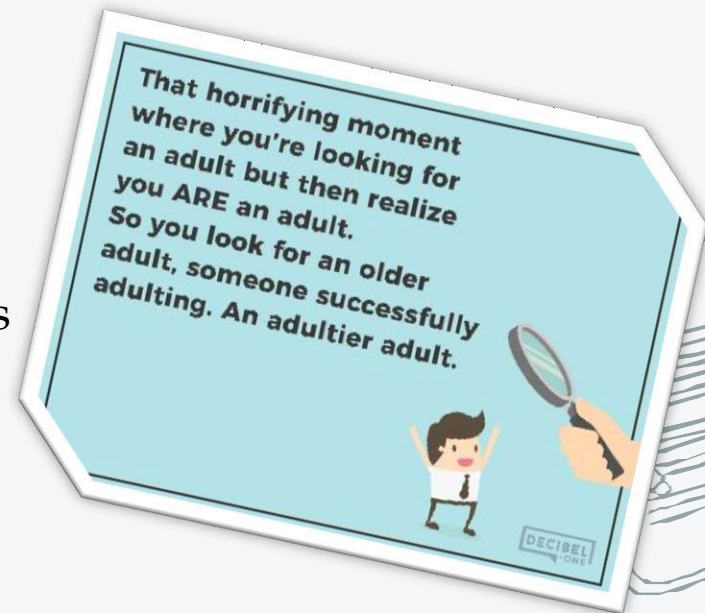
Adult Responsibilities

Adult Responsibilities (con't)

Tips to protect yourself from Identity Theft

- Secure your SSN#: CSUN will never ask you for your Social Security Number through email or over the phone
- Memorize your passwords: Never write them down or carry them with you
- Shred everything: Shred all papers that contain personal information before you toss them out
- Unauthorized charges: Watch your bank statements for unauthorized charges. If you see any suspicious activity, report it immediately

Campus Standards – Ethical Issues

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Immunization

CSU Immunization Requirements Fall 2022

The CSU **requires** that all new students are current for the following:

- **Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR)** *2 doses or positive titer*
- **Hepatitis B (Hep B)** *students 18 or younger 3 doses*
- **Varicella (Chickenpox)** *2 doses or positive titer*
- **Tetanus-Diphtheria-Pertussis (Tdap)** *1 dose after age 7*
- **Meningococcal Disease (A,C,Y,W-135)** *1 dose on/after age 16 for students 21 or younger*
- **Tuberculosis Screening (TB)**

**Students must comply with the requirements no later than the beginning of their second term of enrollment. If requirements are not met, it may result in the inability to enroll in classes.*

CSU Immunization Recommendations

In addition, the CSU encourages students to discuss the following immunizations with their healthcare provider.

- Hepatitis A (Hep A)
- Hepatitis B (Hep B) 19 years of age or older
- Human papillomavirus (HPV)
- Influenza Flu (Flu shot, annually)
- Meningococcal B (Meningitis B)
- Pneumococcal
- Poliovirus (Polio)

University Policy on Alcohol & Illicit Drugs

- Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drugs Policy – *“The manufacture, possession, distribution, sale or use of alcohol, illicit drugs or drug related paraphernalia, and the misuse of legal pharmaceutical drugs on campus, or off campus while on university business or participating in University sponsored functions, is prohibited.”*
- Many people believe that ALL college students drink alcohol. According to the 2018 CSUN National College Health Assessment:
 - - 29 % of CSUN students have never used alcohol
 - - 98 % of CSUN students said that alcohol did not affect their academic performance

Hazing Policy

Hazing: Is any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a student organization or student body, whether or not the organization or body is officially recognized by an educational institution, which is likely to cause serious bodily injury to any former, current, or prospective student of any school, community college, college university or other educational institution in this state.

Types of Hazing:

- Psychological hazing; any action that is against accepted sorority & fraternity standards of conduct, behavior & good taste that is mental in nature and which ridicules, humiliates or embarrasses, or which confuses, frustrates or causes undue stress
- Physical hazing: Anything that causes mental anguish or physical discomfort to the person

Family Education Rights & Privacy Act of 1974

- **Under FERPA a student has certain rights concerning their educational records.**
 - Allows students access to their educational records
 - Gives students certain rights to consent to disclosures to their parties
- **Under FERPA the University, at its discretion, may release directory information such as:**
 - Student's name, address, phone number, email address
 - Student's major, field of study, grade level, enrollment status, dates of attendance
- **Students who choose to prevent release of directory information may do so by completing a Request of Confidentiality Hold on Student Records form in the Office of Admissions & Records**

Emergency Operations Plan

- During an emergency, make sure to
 - Call 911 from a campus phone or 818-677-2111 from a cell phone to report an emergency situation
 - Listen carefully when staff and emergency personnel tell you what to do.
 - Know the emergency location and content of the building evacuation maps, including the designated outside meeting areas for your classes
 - Building evacuation maps are located near the elevators

Emergency Operations Plan


- Learn what to do in an emergency beforehand.
 - **Earthquake:** Duck, cover, and hold on! Evacuation is not automatic in an earthquake. Always wait until the shaking has stopped before exiting the building.
 - **Fire:** Immediately evacuate the building, know 2 exit routes from each classroom.
 - **Shelter in Place:** If a Shelter in Place is ordered, STAY INSIDE. Close windows and doors, move to an interior room if possible. Shelter in Place may be ordered for hazardous materials events, severe weather, or certain violent incidents.

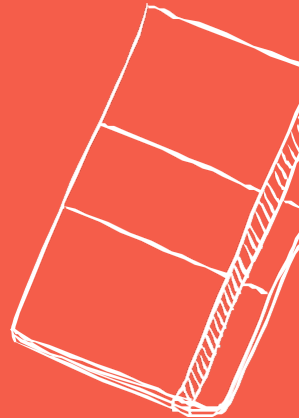
