

# Danielle Spratt, PhD

Associate Professor of English and Director of Faculty Engaged Practices and Service Learning



Danielle Spratt is an associate professor of English and Director of Faculty Engaged Practices and Service Learning in the Office of Community Engagement at CSUN. Her areas of interest include the literature and culture of the seventeenth, eighteenth, and early nineteenth centuries (specifically from 1620-1820), the history of science and medicine, the rise of the novel, print ephemera, feminist and gender theory, public and digital humanities, digital accessibility, experiential and service learning pedagogies, and theories of social justice. She is the current adviser for the English MA program, faculty adviser for the Eighteenth-Century Scriveners, and a member of CSUN's Center for Digital Humanities.

Between MA and PhD programs, Danielle served as an AmeriCorps VISTA volunteer in New York, and she remains committed to working in her community in Los Angeles.

Her work has appeared in journals including *Eighteenth-Century Life*, *Studies in Eighteenth-Century Culture*, and *The Eighteenth Century: Theory and Interpretation*, among other venues, and, with Bridget Draxler, she is the author of *Engaging the Age of Jane Austen: Public Humanities in Practice* (forthcoming, Fall 2018, Iowa University Press's Humanities and Public Life series).
