

Doctor of Audiology (Au.D.) Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's):

1. I have 18 units of graded coursework in a Communication Disorders Department, can I apply to the Au.D. Program?
 - a. Yes, you would be a competitive applicant for the Doctor of Audiology Program. 18 graded units is the minimum requirement to apply to the Doctoral Program
2. How do I apply to the Au.D. Program for Fall 2022?
 - a. This is dual application process. You will need to complete a University Graduate Application and a Department Application. You will find links to these applications through the link above.

 - c. Applications open October 1st and close January 5th annually.
3. What is the GPA and GRE Score an applicant needs to have to be considered for acceptance?
 - a. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 in order to be considered for graduate work. Successful applicants to the Au.D. Program generally have a higher, more competitive GPA.
 - b. The program expects that students achieve scores in the 50th percentile or better in either the Verbal or Quantitative subtests of the GRE. The program prefers a score equivalent to 300 or above in the new GRE scoring system.
 - c. The program employs a holistic approach for reviewing all applications; Mission Statement of the Program, Letters of Recommendation, Statement of Intent, GRE Score along with GPA.
4. Can International Students apply for the Au.D. Program?
 - a. Yes. The department is excited to announce we have been approved to accept International Students into your Doctoral Program.
5. Do you admit students in the Spring semester?
 - a. No. The Department has one Admissions Cycle each year in the Fall.
6. Are there Research Opportunities for the Doctoral student in your program?
 - a. Yes. All faculty in the program have active research in progress and opportunities are available to participate with individual audiology faculty.

7. What funding opportunities exist for Doctoral students?
 - a. In some instances, faculty research has opportunities for paid Research Assistants.
 - b. Additionally, a limited number of Graduate Assistant positions are available.

8. Where do you place students for their off campus clinics?
 - a. During years two and three of your Doctoral studies you may be placed off campus at Private Practices, possibly at the Veteran's Administration (this is a competitive interview process), and/or hospitals.
 - b. Your fourth year of Doctoral studies is entirely off campus.

9. Is the program full time?
 - a. Yes, the program is full time cohorted program.
 - b. Students are required to enroll full time every semester and are expected to be available for both academic instruction and clinic participation on a full time basis.
