## **VI. Program Review Update**

A. Lipscomb attended the Educational Leadership and Policy Studies Department external review exit meeting. He reported on the M.A. degree programs in Educational Administration and Higher Education Leadership. The M.A., Educational Administration program was commended for their response to the state-wide high-risk mandate was evident in the curriculum; strong emphasis on theory and practice; and students spoke very highly of real-life applications. The program was also commended for alignment with classroom, educators, and CalAPA preparation; the strong relationship with students and faculty; and part-time faculty feel heard, valued, and integral to the program. The M.A., Higher Education Leadership program was commended for having strong student engagement; students advancing in their careers; and great reputation of the program. The program was also commended for their strong involvement of adjunct faculty who have guidance on the curriculum and sequencing; adjunct faculty feel like valued members of the program; strong emphasis on theory and practice specifically around social justice and equity; collection and responsiveness of data; and planning of career event in the fall and spring to tailor their programming. The department was commended for their strong collegiality across the three distinct programs and advocacy of programs. The reviewer's recommendations for the M.A., Educational Administration included additional tenure track faculty; greater cohort interactions and strong cohort identities, but ongoing support; find ways for adjunct faculty to engage and support alumni beyond the program completion; knowledge on what can be done with the credential beyond an AVP and principal role; and students want to continue professional learning to bridge statewide and national opportunities. The reviewer's recommendations for the M.A., Higher Education Leadership program included that tenure track faculty line to continue to build and grow the program; collaborate more broadly with Graduate Studies to leverage the program; strategies with who is responsible for data collection; more stable sources of funding to be adopted to support the programming; support beyond the program since students want more opportunities to network and co-curricular building; and continue attention to DEI efforts to strengthen those efforts and advances. The recommendations for the department included the work being done around assessments and how the labor is going to be undertaken, how it will be done equitably, and how it can be extended beyond the department and college to ensure infrastructure and support; and resources and being creative with ways to engage with personnel until they seek additional tenure track faculty.

## VII. Discussion Items

S. Camara shared details about changes that the Office of Academic Assessment and Program Review is making to align program assessment to meet the graduate Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs). She discussed how they implemented the IROCA process (instructors reporting on classroom assessment) to measure outcomes, work with departments to align PLOs to ILOs, and use matrices to align PLOs and ILOs. In addition, she reported that they are gathering data and conducting pilots with two colleges to streamline assessment across the university and two graduate programs have also volunteered to collect data this year. Camara asked for GSC's support with the IROCA process so that more departments would participate in collecting data. D. Spratt thanked Camara for sharing the information with the committee and hearing about the exciting ways assessment will be incorporated into meaningful practices for faculty.

A. Levin reported that the Chancellor's Office issued a memo revising the CSU Policy on the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR). Effective in Fall 2023, the CSU is ending the GWAR for graduate degrees. As a result, the Upper Division Writing Proficiency Exam (UDWPE) can no longer be offered to meet classified status. Levin asked the committee to remove the UDWPE requirement from the classified status policy. The revised classified status policy was **MSP approved**.

D. Spratt reminded the committee of the Academic Technology Committee's (ATC) discussion about the proposed student technology requirements for the Department of Computer Science and the equity implications of the proposal. She reviewed ATC's March 4, 2022 minutes and explained that there was ample discussion from multiple Senate Standing Committee representatives. Spratt said that ATC would provide GSC with the draft resolution after it is routed to Faculty Senate.

D. Spratt shared that the committee would elect the 2022-2023 GSC Chair at the May meeting.

## VIII. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 3:05 p.m.
