Academic Bulletin Description

Theory and methods of real estate mortgages and investment analysis. Analysis of the instruments, institutions, agencies, and operations involved in the funding and underwriting of real estate investments. Includes emphasis on analytical techniques and computer applications.

Full Course Description

This course is designed to give the student a detailed understanding of real estate finance and investment. It covers the basics of what you need to know as a real estate investor before buying or developing a property and introduces a variety of real estate topics. Since real estate is closely linked with finance and economics, this course will have a quantitative emphasis.

The structure of the course requires significant individual study and preparation outside of class. Each class session will cover major points and concepts contained in the text and readings as well as material not contained in the text. You should not consider the class lectures and discussions to be the entirety of the course.

Prerequisites

RE 412; RE 414; Upper Division Writing Proficiency Exam (UDWPE) score of 8 or higher. BUS 302 and BUS 302L are prerequisites for Business majors.

Learning Outcomes

Integrate real estate financial leverage with financing alternatives. Define and discuss legal considerations in real estate finance. Compare and contrast different methods of financing residential and commercial properties. Integrate income producing properties with valuation fundamentals.

Course Materials

The text for this course is Real Estate Finance (15th edition, ISBN 978-0-007-337735-3) by William Brueggeman and Jeffrey Fisher. The 14th or 16th edition is also suitable for this course. This text contains many excellent problems and examples that will help clarify concepts covered in class. Additional readings will also be set for topics during the course. You are responsible for material covered both in class as well as in all readings.

Three case studies/projects will be assigned in this class. (1) Pinckney Street is an introductory case highlighting the many hurdles one must go through to find and acquire a small income-producing property. (2) Angus Cartwright IV is a classic case on the financial analysis of real estate investments. The case asks you to create pro formas for four different property investments and to consider a range of factors influencing their profitability. (3) Find an investment property and use the techniques learned from this course to calculate holding period returns and make comparison. Note that if a case study is assigned there is an additional charge to download the case study from the publisher.

To achieve a high grade in the case study, students will be required to do more than correctly compute a solution to the case. I will expect a well-argued and critical assessment of the case study question. Students need to be able to provide an explanation of the information they have calculated and show they understand any limitations of the techniques used. They should also make the reader aware of any wider implications of their recommendations.

All course materials comply with copyright/fair use policies.

Financial Calculator

All students are required to have, and know how to use, a calculator that can derive the internal rate of return (IRR) for unequal cash flows, such as the Ti BAII plus, HP-12C, HP-10B or an equivalent model. The memory for all programmable calculators must be cleared before all exams. You may use the calculator function of your cell phone during the exam.

Course Requirements

This course is being offered as a blended course. Much of the work in this course will occur online in Canvas. Online activities and in-class activities are designed to build on each other. Active participation in the online activities and completion of all courework is required in this course. In Canvas, you will interact with course content, me and your classmates in a variety of online activities. I suggest setting aside days and times for completing the online course activities.

The typical structure in Canvas will consist of learning modules, which include:

- Short Video/PowerPoint Lectures
- Readings
- Online Discussions
- Quizzes
- Written Exercises

This course will meet face-to-face one time per week before Spring Break (Monday) and then be asynchronous classes. The typical activities in the face-to-face classroom will include interacting with guest speakers, engaging with me and your classmates in question and answer sessions, discussing major concepts, practicing difficult key concepts and completing exams.

Course Communication

I will be communicating with you regarding grades and assignments. If you need to get in touch with me, the best method is via email. Generally, I will reply to emails within 24 hours and will provide feedback on assignments within 72 hours.

If you are having trouble with this course or its material, you should contact me via email to discuss the issues.

Announcements will be posted to this course whenever necessary. If there is any other information I think is important, I will send it to your inbox you have in Canvas. It is your responsibility to ensure that your email account works properly in order to receive email.

Technology Requirements

Online lectures through Panapota and YouTube will be provided in Canvas. Therefore, you must have access to the Internet to view/hear lectures. No special software is required.

The lecture presentations, links to articles, assignments, quizzes, and rubrics are located on Canvas. To participate in learning activities and complete assignments, you will need:

- Access to a working computer that has a current operating system with updates installed, plus speakers or headphones to hear lecture presentations;
- Reliable Internet access and a CSUN email account;
- A current Internet browser that is compatible with Canvas:
- Microsoft Word as your word processing program; and
- Reliable data storage for your work, such as a USB drive or Office365 OneDrive cloud storage.

Minimum Technical Skills Needed

Minimum technical skills are needed in this course. Most course work will be completed and submitted in Canvas. Therefore, you must have consistent and reliable access to a computer and the Internet. The minimum technical skills you have include the ability to:

Course Assignments and Grading

- Complete rubrics for assignments will be provided in Canvas.

Formatting

All written assignments are required to be submitted using Microsoft Word. There are no exceptions to this rule. Documents should be proofread to avoid spelling and grammatical mistakes. Additionally, all

written assignments will be evaluated based on "quality" and not simply "quantity." In addition, all written assignments should adhere to the following guidelines:

- Spacing: one and a half;
- Font: either Tahoma or Arial in 12 point (size);
- Title of assignment centered on first page, followed by student name in next line;
- Documentation for all references and quotations using APA style; and
- Accurate spelling and grammar.

Quizzes

Nine quizzes will be assigned. Each quiz will be based on book chapters and will consist of True/False & Multiple Choice questions. Quizzes will be automatically evaluated. Quiz questions/answers are randomly displayed and drawn from substantial test banks. You will have 2 opportunities to complete quizzes to achieve a higher score. The highest score will be recorded.

Case Studies

Three case studies will be assigned. You may only complete each case study one time. Complete rubic will be provided in Canvas.

Final Exam

The final exam will consist of True/False, Multiple Choice and Short Answer questions. The final exam is comprehensive. Exam questions/answers are randomly displayed and drawn from substantial test banks. The exam is secured in Canvas with a password.

Evaluation and Grading Scale

All grades will be posted on Canvas. You are strongly encouraged to check you scores in Canvas regularly. A final letter grade will be assigned based on percentages.
