## CSUN Police Services Reaccredited for Maintaining Excellent Standards

The International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators (IACLEA) once again gave its seal of approval to Cal State Northridge's 90-person Department of Police Services, which includes 43 civilians, 25 sworn officers, and 22 students. According to Northridge police officials, only 5 percent of police agencies are accredited.

"The set of standards utilized in the program represent the best set of practices in law enforcement and campus public safety," said John Leonard, director of IACLEA's accreditation and LEMAP (Loaned Executive Management Assistance Program). "It demonstrates the agency and its personnel's commitment to their constituency."

A two-person team visited the campus in March and evaluated such areas as administration, management, support services, policies and procedures. Faculty, staff and students were also encouraged to provide comments on police services.

There are 236 standards that a department must meet to receive accreditation.

"It's important for the CSUN community to know that their police department follows the best practices of the law enforcement profession in all that we do to serve the community," said CSUN Police Chief Anne Glavin. "This means that they can be assured of the highest degree of professional standards and quality service."

Cal State Northridge Department of Police Services helped IACLEA pilot the accreditation program. The department was first accredited in 2008.

Students, faculty and staff have unlimited access to the compound while attending CSUN. There are currently three locations open on the first levels of the B3, B5 & G3 parking structures. Several additional locations (in student housing) are anticipated to open within the next year. Users have access to ALL locations, including any future compounds.

## Quick Crime Prevention Tips!

We've narrowed it down for you; the top tips Police Services wants you to know so you can continue to stay safe at CSUN (and so you can keep all your belongings with you too!):

- NEVER leave a laptop, or personal belongings (purse/cell phone/backpack) unattended-even if you're just going down the hall. It takes less than a minute for a thief to walk off with your property.
- Lock your doors and windows. Whether its your dorm, your home, or your officelock it. Keep valuables with you or locked up out of sight.
- Immediately report lost or stolen state keys and access cards. If the keys or cards are for a lab or office contact your supervisor and the lock shop ASAP.
- Don't entertain solicitors on campus. Politely walk away and when safe to do so, notify CSUN PD (818)-677-2111. Soliciting and distributing literature without approval from the university is not allowed. Often times, it's not even a legitimate business but a scam.

Our departments fleet is going green! With the end of this fiscal year, we have made a number of purchases designed to increase cost savings and improve operational efficiencies during the continued budget crunch within the CSU system. The Chief of Police has authorized the purchase of two Ford Escapes, one for Parking Services and a second for training purposes which will replace an old Crown Victoria. A Ford Fusion will replace another Crown Vic for detectives and a third hybrid vehicle will be driven by the Chief while her vehicle will be repainted and reconditioned for patrol supervisors. Fuel efficient gas/electric hybrids vehicles, like the Escape, will save on fuel costs and provide increased space for passengers/equipment.
