After I added the class, I read online reviews which seemed comforting; however the idea of having an eight unit seven hour combination class on a Saturday was overwhelming. I contemplated for weeks whether I should drop the class or have the courage to take it. After the first fifteen minutes on the first day of instruction, I made my decision. Dr J, as we referred to him later, made everyone in the class feel comfortable about the upcoming semester. He made it very clear that if any student needed extra help, he would be available anytime to help us understand the material. Soon enough, I realized he was not like other professors who expected their students to do well in class and understand the subject matter simply because they themselves do. Dr. J was encouraging, comforting and did an excellent job taking the time to explain the lessons. Unlike other professors, he never expressed annoyance when students were struggling and needed help with the same lesson. He went above and beyond in making himself accessible to all his students. Throughout the entire semester his office hours turned into extra instruction time for the students who wanted help outside of class. Even though he could have easily spent his office hours sitting comfortably answering questions from a few students, instead he would run review sessions going over the lectures, explaining the material over again until each student gained an understanding. Almost every student would attend his office hours since the material was quite challenging and Dr J truly cared about each individual and always encouraged us to try to the best of our abilities. Besides coming in early and staying past his office hours, he set up extra days especially before tests to help us with questions, not to mention his prompt and thorough email responses to our last minute questions. I remember a student who missing class due to some personal issues and Dr J actually made the effort to contact the student to make sure they do not fall behind. I really have not had the opportunity to meet another professor who truly cares as much about his student's success as Dr J does.

I am nominating Professor Schutte for other reasons as well. For example, Professor Schutte is uniquely dedicated to his students. He regularly holds tutoring services for students during his office hours. As a result of these efforts, I gained the confidence and skills needed to pass his course. Aside from this and perhaps more importantly, I continue to maintain a mentor-like relationship with Professor Schutte, which continues to inspire me to pursue my educational dreams.

As a former student of Dr. Jerald Schutte I, beyond doubt, support his nomination for the CSUN Distinguished Teaching Award for 2011-12. He deserves this award because he truly is an outstanding professor with great qualities and talent.

The superiority of Dr. Schutte's instruction over exceeded my expectation of this course because Dr. Schutte was always prepared and organized. Dr. Schutte has the magnificent ability to combine Sociology 364 and 497 together in such manner that the class materials compliment and reinforce one another without confusion, while also incorporating other sociological terms. What stood out the most about Dr. Schutte was his incredible ability to reach out and connect with his students. Dr. Schutte always encouraged questions and never belittled his students regardless of how dull the questions may be and he encouraged us to always think "outside the box." Dr. Schutte suggested a "partner system" where the student with the highest grade in class was paired with the lowest grade student for tutoring purposes. I would like to give my support for the nomination of Professor Jerald Schutte for the CSUN Distinguished Teaching Award for 2011-12. Professor Schutte is not only a wonderful teacher but also a wonderful mentor, friend, and someone I consider family, in fact it feels weird referring to him as Professor Schutte, for I know him as Jerry, because that is the level of comfort he brings to his class and teaching style.

Taking a combined, hybrid, and six hour Sunday class (Soc 364 and Soc 497) seems like a daunting process, but with Jerry at the front of the class it's a walk through the park. I went into the class not expecting much from the professor, or from the students, but after the first hour I knew that Jerry was different, and as a result so was the class; he is one of those rare college professors that actually cares about his student's success. He doesn't <u>say</u> he wants to see you succeed (like most professors), but he <u>shows</u> you by offering his time in many different ways. One way is that he holds office hours, and tries to find a time that the majority of the class are available, these office hours soon turn into a mini class session, because a lot of the students are there, and the material is gone over again and aspects of the class that people are having problems with are gone over in more detail. Another way that he makes himself available is through the eliminate sessions, which are online study sessions that he holds before each exam, so that the material is fresh in our minds. He is also available through email, and will get back to you that same day. This type of availability from a professor is rare, and is much appreciated. He also makes himself available during class time, and during class breaks.

During the class he will stop his lecture ad answer questions as students have them he will also provide commentary on comments that students make on something (i.e. if a student ties in a lesson to real life, Jerry will provide more examples or simply agree with that person's example). He also records all of his lectures, and posts them up onto moodle and his webpage, where they become available to students to re-listen to no later than 3 hours after class ends. Also another feature of his class, one that I am very fond of, is he assigns us partners after the first exam, pairing higher percentage students with the lower ones, and the higher one acts sort of like a mentor in studying tips, different ways of remembering things, etc. Jerry also encourages us to form study groups, which I did within the second week, and it was that study group that helped me the most, not with just the material, but with my life, and the problems I was having at the time. I formed lifetime binds with the people in my study group, we still meet every week like we did when we were in class, just to hang out and catch up.

Professor Jerald Schutte is a professor that all professors should take a class from, and learn a thing or two of what it means to actually teach, and not just stand in front of a class reciting facts. Jerry lets his students know he cares through his actions, and when he says "no student left behind" he means it. When he sees someone is struggling, he enlists the help of fellow classmates to help those that are falling behind.
